The Full Assurance of Hope Hebrews 6:9-20 10-2-22

How can we hold on to hope in all situations?

I. We live in God's presence.

Hebrews 6:9-10 — "Though we speak in this way, yet in your case, beloved, we feel sure of better things things that belong to salvation. For God is not unjust so as to overlook your work and the love that you have shown for his name in serving the saints, as you still do."

God rewards us in two areas:

- 1. Our work The things we do.
- 2. Our love The reason we do, our motives.

II. We surround ourselves with fellow believers.

Hebrews 6:11-12 — "And we desire each one of you to show the same earnestness to have the full assurance of hope until the end, so that you may not be sluggish, but imitators of those who through faith and patience inherit the promises."

Five Qualities to look for in people we surround ourselves with:

- 1. People who want us to mature in our faith. (we desire each one)
- 2. People who are diligent in obedience to Christ. (earnestness)
- 3. People who are <u>not lazy</u> in their relationship with Christ. (not be sluggish)
- 4. People who are unwavering in their commitment to Christ. (faith)
- 5. People who are <u>long-suffering</u> in the adversities of life. (patient)

III. We trust what God promises.

Hebrews 6:13-18 — "For when God made a promise to Abraham, since he had no one greater by whom to swear, he swore by himself, saying, 'Surely I will bless you and multiply you.' And thus Abraham, having patiently waited, obtained the promise. For people swear by something greater than themselves, and in all their disputes an oath is final for confirmation. So when God desired to show more convincingly to the heirs of the promise the unchangeable character of his purpose, he guaranteed it with an oath, so that by two unchangeable things, in which it is impossible for God to lie, we who have fled for refuge might have strong encouragement to hold fast to the hope set before us."

What do we learn about the promises of God from the passage quoted by the writer of Hebrews? (Genesis 22:1-18)

- 1. Obedience to God doesn't mean life will be easy.
- 2. Sometimes trusting God seems impossible.
- 3. <u>Immediate</u> obedience is the best way to see God work.
- 4. God is working in his <u>timing</u>, not ours.
- 5. God always shows up.

IV. We run to Him for refuge.

Hebrews 6:18-20 – "...so that by two unchangeable things, in which it is impossible for God to lie, we who have fled for refuge might have strong encouragement to hold fast to the hope set before us. We have this as a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters into the inner place behind the curtain, where Jesus has gone as a forerunner on our behalf, having become a high priest forever after the order of Melchizedek."

What is available when we trust God's promises and run to him for refuge?

- 1. Encouragement
- 2. Hope
- 3. Access to the throne
